Spoited at the Airship Run



You don't see a Hercules Corvette for ages—then three turn up at once.

Of course, this didn't happen by pure chance although there was a certain amount of coincidence in there being three Corvettes up & running, taxed & tested, and available.

Getting three Corvettes to the start was one thing, getting them all round the course was quite another. They all broke down—one of them broe down twice—and none completed the run under its own power.

However, the following weekend, all three were at the Coprolite Run and, this time, all three were successfully ridden all the way round the route.

Powered by a Lavalette engine and utilising several parts from the Phillips Panda Plus, the Corvette was produced for less than two years, being launched soon after the TI-Raleigh merger in 1960. It ceased production in 1961 after the decision to replace all TI's moped ranges with licence-built Mobylettes.

This one was the head-turner at our AGM run: a Fantic Chopper.

Fantic produced the Chopper in two sizes: 125cc and 50cc; this one, as you can tell from the pedals, is the 50cc version. This is a 'sixteener special': one of the machines that the moped law was changed to outlaw n the 1970s. Being under-50cc and with pedals made it legally a moped that could be ridden at age sixteen. A contemporary road test (*Motorcycle Mechanics*, December 1972) reported that it was the most powerful moped they'd seen and was capable of just over 50mph ... or a bit more under the right conditions.

This is Paul Kelling's latest acquisition and he only collected it a few days before Kneel's Wheels. Not surprising, therefore, that it suffered from a few teething troubles on the run. What's it like to ride with that long fork? Paul's own observations mirrored those in the 1972 test: 'Handling came as a big surprise, simply because it did ... the roadholding proved better than many machines of comparable performance. Manoeuverability too, wasn't too bad, considering the 57 in, wheelbase.'

A teenager's dream from the '70s and, for most, only a dream because very few teenagers would have been able to afford one.



Club News

AGM

The AGM was uneventful: no resignations from the committee and no change to subscriptions. Alan Course was elected as an additional committee member.

The minutes of the meeting and last year's accounts are on the club's website ... or you can ask the secretary for a copy.

DVLA

The closure of DVLA local offices is almost complete, with the last few shutting down on 15 December.

We are now able to provided certified copies of original documents for V765s. However, this still involves posting documents so it's not an ideal replacement for popping down to your local DVLA office with the documents.

If you send an original card logbook with a a V765, we can make a certified copy of it, post the original back to you and send the copy on to DVLA. If you'd like us to do this, we will charge an extra £6 to help cover the cost of returning the logbook by Special Delivery.

There have been other changes to DVLA procedures:

- A vehicle cannot now, under any circumstances, be licensed at the same time as a V765 application.
- Vehicles going through a V765 will be given their proper licence class straight away—no longer 'Not Licensed'. This does not affect SORN; Continuous Registration and Continuous Insurance Enforcement still only start when the first tax disc is issued.
- DVLA VIN codes are changing. These are the codes DVLA issues when a vehicle doesn't have a VIN or frame/chassis number. They used to be SABTVROxxxxxxxxx and will now be DVLASWA397yydddnn.
- Club datings will now only be accepted for vehicles over 25 years old or where the manufacturer is unable to assist.
- Clubs that participate in the V765 scheme will be allowed to make certified copies of original documents.

Machine badges

At last, we've had the machine badges made. They are 65mm domed EACC badges with back adhesive and are £2.50 each. They're sized so you can stick them on to various makes of tax disc holders, on your bike, car, glass window, etc. Contact our Regalia man, Guy Bolton at guy.bolton@btinternet.com or call 07947-809335.

The usual free pitches for jumble stands—call Paul on 01394 671222 to allow him to set your spot in the hall. Jumble opens from 9:30am, run sets off at 11am. Everyone welcome. The Radar Run has an alternative, shorter route suitable for cyclemotors.

Sunday 27 April Ride it! Every year the FBHVC has its Drive it/Ride it Day. The aim is to increase public awareness of Vintage and Classic vehicles by having as many as possible on the road for one day. There are many events—see the Federation Website at www.fbhvc.co.uk—for more details. This year there will be a DID/RID centre at Bressingham—ideally placed for many of our club's members.

After a while fiddling with it, it was diagnosed as a carburettor problem which would be fixable if only we had the tools to get at it! So it was retired to the van, the other two set off and Andrew accepted a lift with Daniel to the lunch stop. About half a mile after the start, Danny's Corvette died. Being so close to the start, he elected to pedal it back. Martin's machine was still going strong.

The final few arrivals brought news of where he had broken down; Daniel went and fetched him and his Corvette. However, after lunch, it refused to start. It was loaded onto the back-up trailer leaving Danny, Andrew, Martin, and Martin's Corvette all to return with Daniel. It was at this point we discovered that David had ridden off on his Berini with the keys to

Daniel's van in his pocket!

Team Corvette reconvened a week later at the Coprolite Run; all three completed the course with no traumas.
