Some prices up—some as before

"We are gratified to learn that this emergency measure is not protectionist and Mr. Wilson's television statement that the measure is not aimed at sheltering our own industries from healthy and vigorous competition is especially reassuring in view of the reception the measure has had from our own Industries' Association." This statement from Jim Harrison, general sales manager of Honda, just about sums up feeling amongst importers of two-wheelers and accessories following the new Government's imposition of an additional 15 per cent import duty on these goods.

Some of the Honda prices go up, but the 50cc C102 is unchanged in price, similarly the C110, C114, CB72 and CB77.

BMW says that prices will continue as before while current stocks last.

Accessory importers, Michael Agencies, says that on the assumption that the measure is necessary. Where necessary, they will be prepared to raise prices.

Hans Motors, the Heinkel and Kreidler importers state that prices remain as before. Stocks should last for the next two or three months.
