45% FEWER CYCLISTS IN 16 YEARS

AT Paddington track, London, recently, A a trial run was given to the Britax 48 c.c. cycle-motor which may be seen in action on London area tracks next season as a pacing machine. The actual

model used for the trial was a stock machine but our artist has altered the photograph to give an impression of what the machine of what the machine may look like after modification for pacing. Top speed is over 50 m.p.h. but it cannot be pedalled whilst the engine is operating at speed. It is hoped to devise a system of gearing so that both pacer

and pace-follower can pedal—as on the Continent with the Derny machines. These machines do not need a special pace-following bicycle, thus being good for use in omnium racing. D.
